## About Your Home

Gloxinias are becoming more and more popular all over the United States as a house plant. There are sections in the South-eastern part of the country where these strikingly beautiful plants can be grown out of doors. However, most of us have to be satisfied with growing them in pots in the house.

Gloxinias can be grown from mature bulbs or tubers, from young potted plants, or from seed. You can multiply your plants by growing more from leaf cuttings. Large tubers planted on November will flower the following spring. They will continue to

bloom for as long as eight weeks. The older, slipper type, may bloom for three months at a time.

Do not economize when buying tubers. You can look on this purchase as a long term investment for they have been known to grow and flower for fifty years or more. Gloxinia tubers should be planted in a soil rich in organic matter, such as leaf mold, compost, or rotted manure. Put about an inch of charcoal in the bottom of each pot for drainage. Any soil mixture that grows African violets will be fine for growing gloxinias.

Tubers under one-and-one-half inches in diameter should be placed in five-inch pots. Larger tubers should be grown in six or seven-inch pots. Prolonged excessive heat will shorten the blooming period of the plant. The most successful way to water is at the surface. Keep applying water until it runs out at the bottom of the pot. Repeat again when the surface soil appears dry.

Plants seem to do best in a South or East window where they can get all the sunlight possible during the winter. During the summer Gloxinias must have shade. After your plants have bloomed, give them a rest for a few weeks. Water less often. In September or October the tops will die down. Now it is time to repot the tubers before setting them away for a

time in a dark closet or basement. Keep the soil slightly moist until new growth appears.

When the growth does appear, bring them into the light. The process of growing and blooming begins again.
